

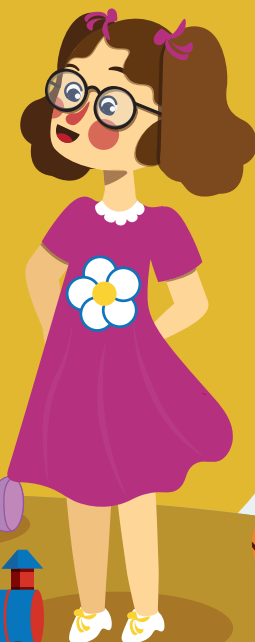
We Can Be

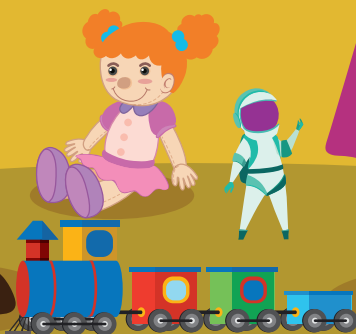
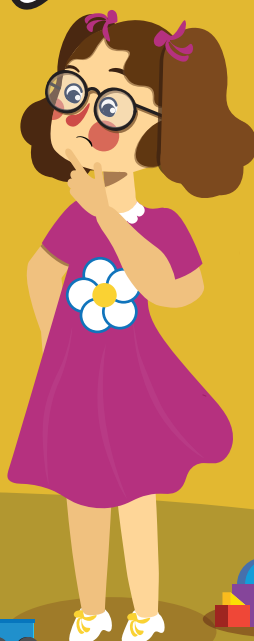
